James 1:2 (NKJV) - My brethren, count it all joy when you fall into various trials, James 1:3 (NKJV) - knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience. James 1:4 (NKJV) - But let patience have its perfect work, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking nothing.

Romans 5:3-5 (NKJV) – "And not only that, but **we also glory in tribulations**, **knowing that** tribulation **produces** perseverance; and perseverance, character; and character, hope."

1 Peter 4:12-13 (NLT) – "Dear friends, **don't be surprised at the fiery trials** you are going through, as if something strange were happening to you. Instead, be very glad—for these trials make you partners with Christ in his suffering."

7. A Mature Christian Has a Servant's Heart

True spiritual maturity is demonstrated through humility and service.

Spiritual Aspect:

Jesus modeled servant leadership. God exalts those who humble themselves. **Practical Application:** Serving in church, community, and family. Putting others' needs before personal gain. Being generous with time, resources, and encouragement.

Mark 10:45 (ESV) – "For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

Philippians 2:3 (NKJV) - Let nothing be done through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself.

Philippians 2:4 (NKJV) - Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others.

Matthew 23:11-12 (NKJV) – "But he who is greatest among you shall be your servant. And whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

Conclusion

A mature Christian is marked by love, faith, self-control, prayer, endurance, and a servant's heart. Maturity is not about perfection but about continual growth in Christlikeness. **Final Challenge:**

1. A Mature Christian Walks in Love

A mark of maturity is an unwavering commitment to love God and others.

Spiritual Aspect:

God is Love and should be reflected in His children. Maturity means loving even when it's difficult, forgiving freely, and seeking peace.

Practical Application:

Showing kindness and patience in daily interactions. Choosing forgiveness over offense. Helping others without expecting anything in return.

John 13:34 (NKJV) - A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another.

John 13:35 (NKJV) - By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another."

1 Corinthians 13:4 (ESV) - Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant

1 Corinthians 13:5 (ESV) - or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful;

1 Corinthians 13:6 (ESV) - it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. 1 Corinthians 13:7 (ESV) - Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

1 Corinthians 13:8 (ESV) - Love never ends.

1 John **4:7-8 (NLT)** - Dear friends, let us continue to love one another, for love comes from God. Anyone who loves is a child of God and knows God.

2. A Mature Christian Lives by Faith, Not Feelings

Faith is a constant reliance on God, not emotions or circumstances.

Spiritual Aspect:

Trusting in God's promises even when things don't make sense.

Not being controlled by fear or anxiety.

Practical Application:

Making decisions based on God's Word rather than emotions. Maintaining joy even in trials. Being faithful in tithing, giving, and obedience to God. 2 Corinthians 5:7 (NKJV) - "For we walk by faith, not by sight."

Hebrews 11:6 (AMP) - But without faith it is impossible to please and be satisfactory to Him. For whoever would come near to God must [necessarily] believe that God exists and that He is the rewarder of those who earnestly and diligently seek Him [out].

Romans 10:17 (ESV) - "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of God."

3. A Mature Christian Guards Their Words

What comes out of our mouths reveals the state of our hearts.

Spiritual Aspect:

Words have power to bring life or destruction. Speaking truth and wisdom, not gossip or negativity. **Practical Application:** Controlling speech in anger. Encouraging others rather than tearing them down. Speaking God's Word over circumstances.

Proverbs 18:21 (NKJV) – "**Death and life are in the power of the tongue**, and those who love it will eat its fruit."

Ephesians 4:29 (NLT) – "Don't use foul or abusive language. Let everything you say be good and helpful, so that **your words will be an encouragement** to those who hear them."

James 3:2 (ESV) – "For we all stumble in many ways. And if anyone does not stumble in what he says, he is a perfect man, able also to bridle his whole body."

4. A Mature Christian Lives a Life of Word and Prayer

A mature believer maintains constant communication with God.

Spiritual Aspect:

Word and Prayer strengthens my relationship with God. Both are ways of receiving wisdom, direction, and power. **Practical Application:** Making time for daily prayer and study of the Word. Praying for others and not just self. Praying before making decisions. Psalm 119:105 (NKJV) - "Your word is a lamp to my feet And a light to my path."

John 8:31-32 (NKJV) – "Then Jesus said to those Jews who believed Him, 'If you abide in My word, you are My disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.'"

Proverbs 4:20-22 (NKJV) – "My son, **give attention to my words**; Incline your ear to my sayings. Do not let them depart from your eyes; Keep them in the midst of your heart; For **they are life** to those who find them, And **health to all their flesh**."

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 (ESV) – "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances..."

Philippians 4:6 (NKJV) – "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God."

James 5:16 (AMP) - The earnest (heartfelt, continued) prayer of a righteous man makes tremendous power available [dynamic in its working].

5. A Mature Christian Bears the Fruit of the Spirit

The evidence of spiritual growth is the fruit of the Spirit in daily life.

Spiritual Aspect:

A transformed heart produces good fruit. The Holy Spirit cultivates Christlike character. **Practical Application:** Responding with patience in frustrating situations. Showing kindness to difficult people. Exercising self-control in speech, habits, and decisions.

Galatians 5:22 (NKJV) - But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, Galatians 5:23 (NKJV) - gentleness, self-control. Against such there is no law.

Matthew 7:16 (NLT) - "You can identify them by their fruit, that is, by the way they act."

John 15:5 (ESV) – "I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing."

6. A Mature Christian Endures Hardships with Joy

Trials are opportunities for growth, not reasons to give up.

Spiritual Aspect: Perseverance through trials builds faith. God uses hardships to refine and strengthen us. Practical Application: Not complaining during difficulties. Seeking God's purpose in trials. Encouraging others who are struggling.
